




Destination BC is rounding up relevant research and articles each week related to the travel and tourism industry and COVID-19.

Last week in brief:

- Support for travel within BC is increasing: 56% of British Columbians would plan a trip in the next four weeks. Although, 49% of BC residents find leaving the house to be stressful during COVID-19.
- BC residents are becoming more comfortable with the idea of receiving visitors in their community.
- 38% of Americans said they find a familiar destination more appealing during COVID-19.
- Globally, long-haul forward bookings for flights in the first week in November 2020 are 59% below normal levels.

BC residents comfort in travelling is on the rise

- BC residents are becoming more comfortable with the idea of travelling within BC and receiving visitors in their community
- 68% of BC residents would make a nonessential trip within BC as of June 10, up from 47% on May 13. Nearly threequarters of BC residents would be comfortable travelling by car/RV, up from 55% on May 13.
- Fewer residents are concerned about visitors from outside of their community visiting their own community at 43% concerned, down from 66% on May 13.
- 56% of British Columbians would plan a trip in the next four weeks, which is positive news for the summer travel season.



BC residents are more open to welcoming visitors into their community from other parts of Canada than they were a month ago

- Support for travel within BC is increasing, albeit more slowly than in past weeks.
- British Columbia saw a significantly positive shift in sentiment towards visitors from other parts of Canada, up to 31% as of June 16 from 17% on May 11. This is especially true for rural residents.





To what extent do you agree or disagree with each of the following statements?

While BC residents are open to travelling soon, many find it stressful leaving the house during COVID-19

- 47% of BC residents believe the end of COVID-19's 1st wave has been reached. Three-quarters (74%) think there will be a 2nd wave of the virus.
- 46% of Canadians find leaving the house stressful during COVID-19.
- With the exception of Ontario residents, BC residents find leaving the house most stressful (51% of BC residents) relative to residents from other provinces (for example, just 33% of residents from Quebec now find leaving the house stressful.





American travellers finding familiar destinations more appealing at this time

While BC is still in Phase 2 of the BC Restart Plan, and is not open to travel from the USA or International countries, this information is provided to highlight global trends of relevance to BC now.

- The majority of American travellers feel they are informed about potential Coronavirus-related risks involved with travelling, and nearly 70% of Americans say they will take at least one leisure trip this year.
- 38% of travellers said familiar destinations are more appealing during COVID-19.
- 61% of Americans said they would be less or much less interested in visiting a destination that appeared crowded or exhibited poor "pandemic etiquette" in media coverage. 66% reported seeing this kind of coverage in the media.





Air passengers waiting longer to travel, booking later

- Internationally, overall airline bookings are down 82% year-over-year compared to June 2019.
- Long-haul forward bookings for the first week in November 2020 are 59% below normal levels.
- Passengers are booking closer to the time of travel. 41% of May 2020 bookings were for travel within 3 days, compared to 18% in May 2019.
- 45% of travellers intend to use air transportation within a few months of the pandemic subsiding, with 36% wanting to wait six months. This is a significant shift from April 2020, which saw 61% and 21%, respectively.
