

British Columbia is in Phase 3 of BC's Restart Plan

On June 24, 2020, it was announced that British Columbia is taking the next step in BC's Restart Plan with a gradual transition to Phase 3, including the smart, safe and respectful return of travel and tourism within the province.

On November 18, 2020, Canadian and US officials agreed to extend the closure of the border between the two countries to non-essential travel until at least December 21, 2020.

While BC is in Phase 3 of the BC Restart Plan, and is not open to non-essential travel from the US or International countries, information provided in this Research Roundup Report highlights not only local insights, but global insights which may be applicable to BC now.



To get COVID-19 transmission under control right now, the Province is urging all British Columbians to press pause on non-essential travel and stay in their local community. This includes a temporary pause on inter-provincial travel and travel throughout British Columbia. Some insights noted in this Research Roundup were gathered prior to this announcement by BC's Provincial Health Officer, Dr Bonnie Henry, on November 19.



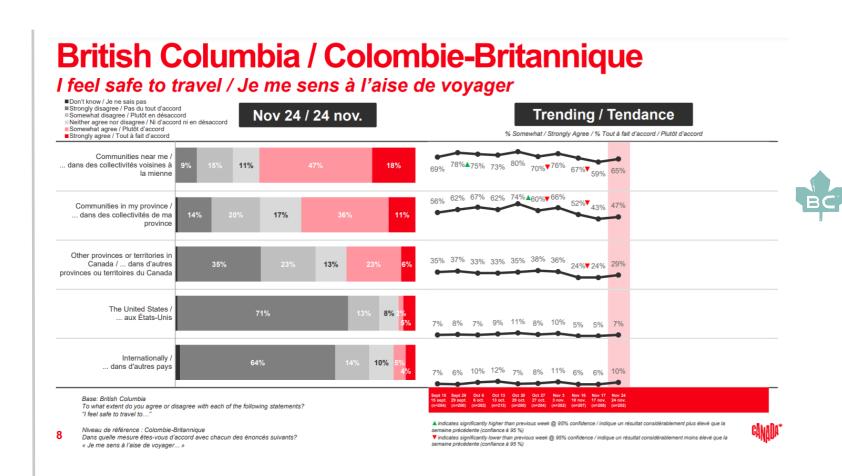

BC residents feel safer to travel than last week, breaking a month-long trend

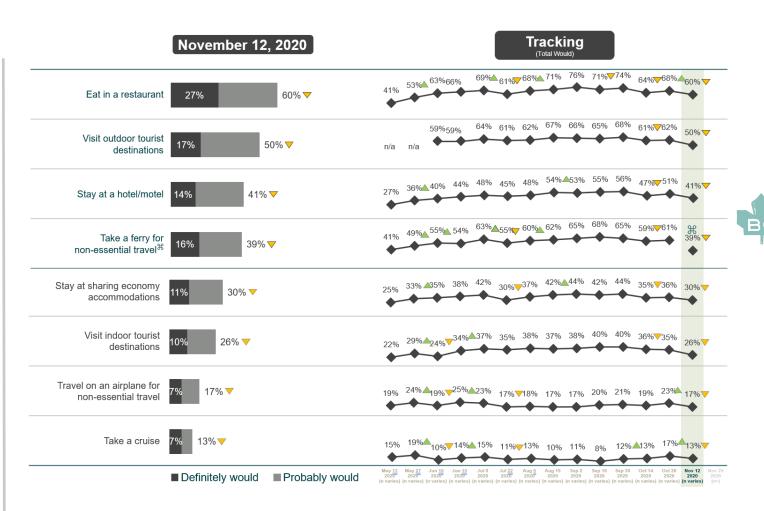
- In Destination Canada's Wave 25 (November 24) report, the number of British Columbians that felt at least somewhat safe to travel to nearby communities increased from 59% to 65%. Feelings of safety to travel within the province also increased from the previous wave (from 43% to 47%).
- Feelings of safety travelling to other provinces or internationally remain low but also saw upticks.

BC residents' comfort with tourism activities drops

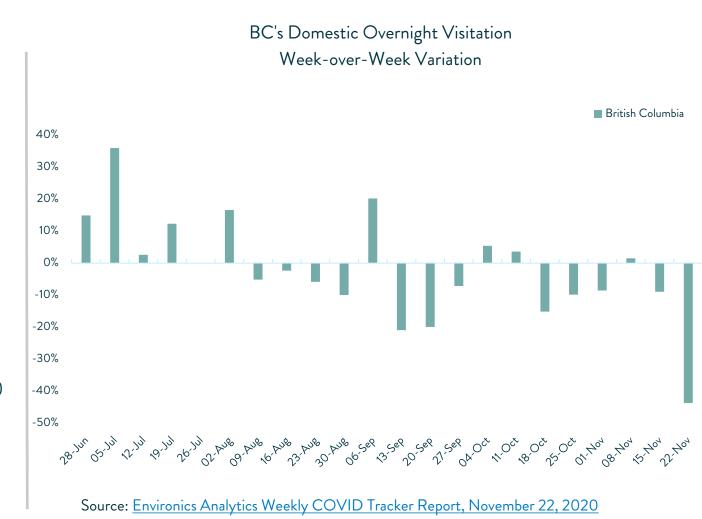
- Wave 14 (November 12) of Destination BC's BC Residents' Public Perceptions survey shows that BC residents' comfort levels with tourism activities are down across the board, with the exception of visiting a provincial park or visiting a beach and/or lake.
- This includes comfort with non-essential travel on an airplane and taking a cruise, both of which saw decreased levels of comfort from Wave 13.
- Note that the Wave 14 BC Residents' Public Perceptions survey was in field after the initial announcement from the PHO to limit social interaction and non-essential travel within and to/from Vancouver Coast Health and Fraser Health regions, and before the wider Provincial restrictions were in place on November 19.





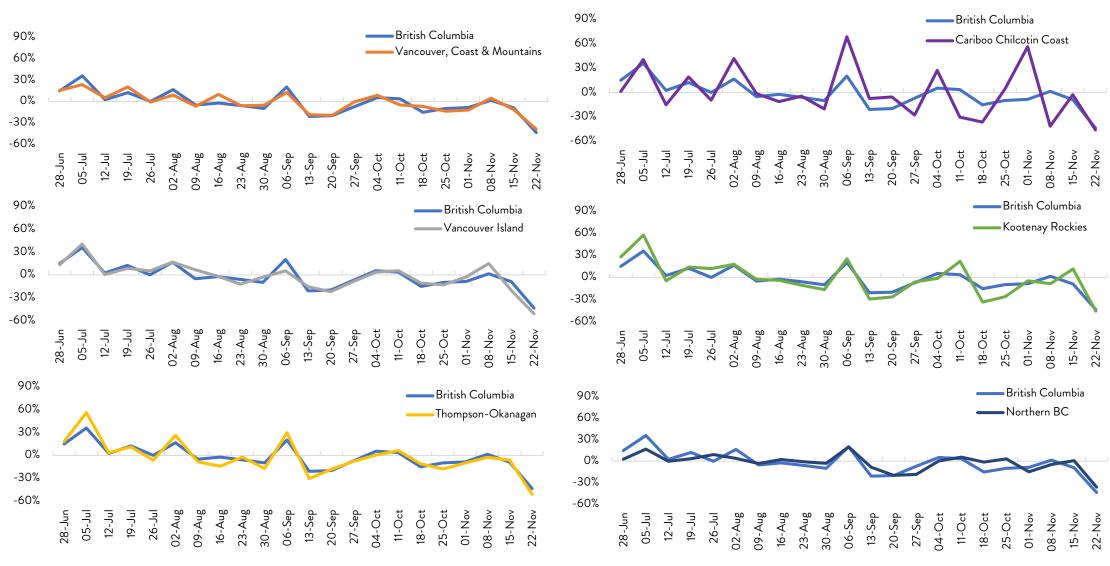
BC continues to see weekly decrease in domestic overnight visitation compared to previous week

- According to Environics Analytics Weekly COVID Tracker Report, during the week ending November 22, BC experienced a week-overweek decrease (-43.6%).
- Week-over-week decreases in movement in domestic overnight visitation were seen throughout the whole province:
 - Vancouver Island (-51.0%)
 - Thompson Okanagan (-50.9%)
 - Cariboo Chilcotin Coast (-45.9%)
 - Kootenay Rockies (-45.7%)
 - Vancouver, Coast & Mountains (-38.8%)
 - Northern BC (-36.2%)





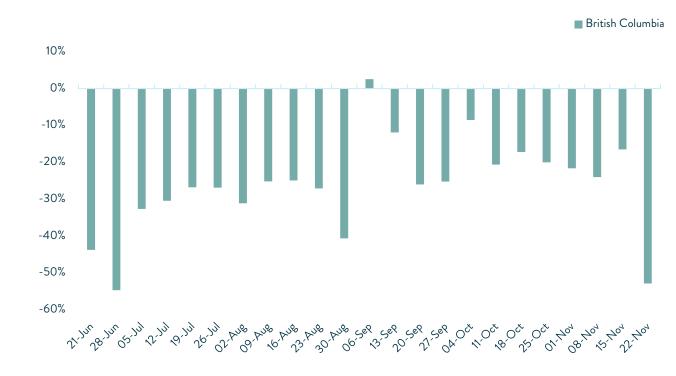
BC and Regional Domestic Overnight Visitation Week-over-Week Variation



11th consecutive decrease in weekly movement in BC compared to same period in 2019

- Environics Analytics also reports year-over-year analysis in the Weekly COVID Tracker Report.
- For the eleveth consecutive week, BC's overnight domestic visitation was down (-52.9%) for the week ending November 22 compared to the same week in 2019.
- A year-over-year decrease in visitation was seen for all tourism regions:
 - Vancouver Island (-59.4%)
 - Vancouver, Coast and Mountains (-58.9%)
 - Thompson Okanagan (-53.0%)
 - Kootenay Rockies (-43.3%)
 - Cariboo Chilcotin Coast (-42.8%)
 - Northern BC (-38.3%)

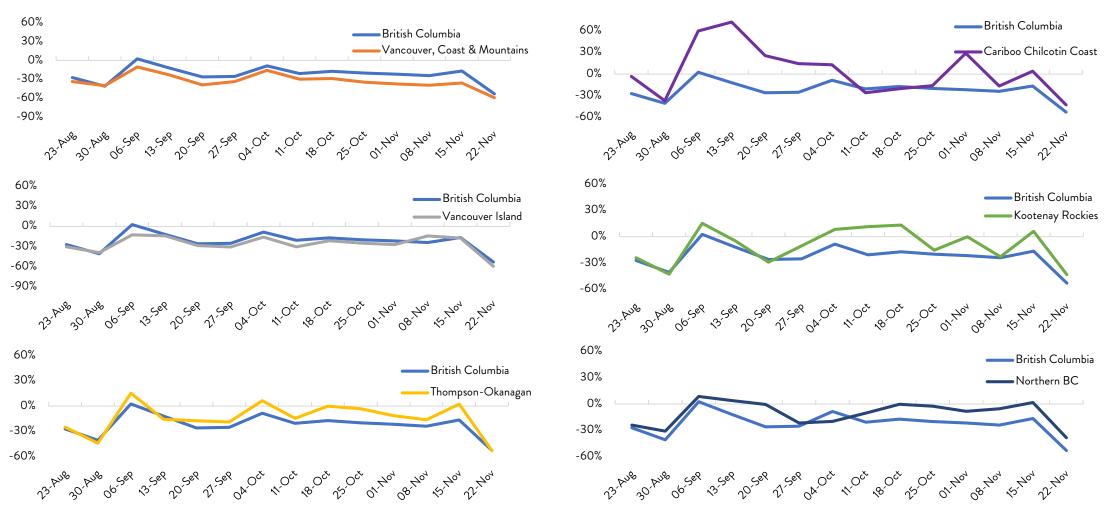
BC's Domestic Overnight Visitation Year-over-Year Percent Change





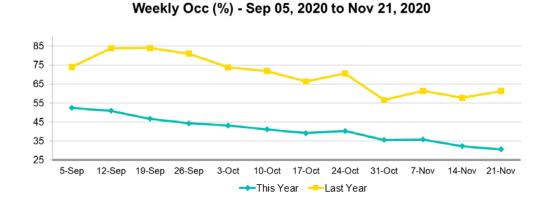

BC and Regional Domestic Overnight Visitation Year-over-Year Percent Change

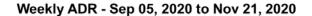


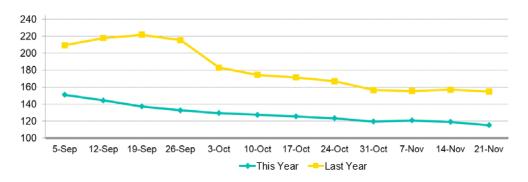
Accommodation performance for BC continues to trend downward

- STR, an agency which captures BC hotel performance, shows the average weekly occupancy for BC was 30.6% for the week of November 15-21, 2020. This represents a decrease of -1.8 points from the previous week and a decrease of -30.7 points compared to the previous year.
- BC's average daily rate (ADR) was \$115.21 for the week of November 15-21, 2020. This represents a -3.5% decrease from the previous week, and a -25.5% decrease compared to a similar period in 2019.

British Columbia's Hotel Occupancy Rate and Average Daily Room Rate

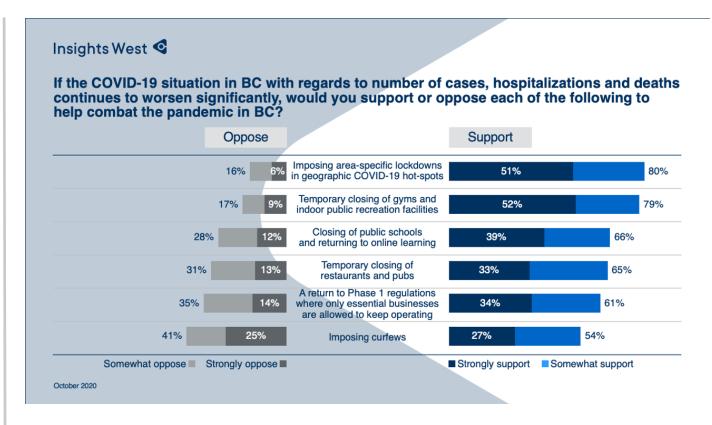

65% of BC residents support a temporary closing of restaurants and pubs

- A recent survey by Insights West indicates that BC residents strongly support increasingly restrictive measures to combat COVID-19.
- 80% support area-specific lockdowns for COVID-19 hotspots and 65% support a temporary closing of restaurants and pubs.

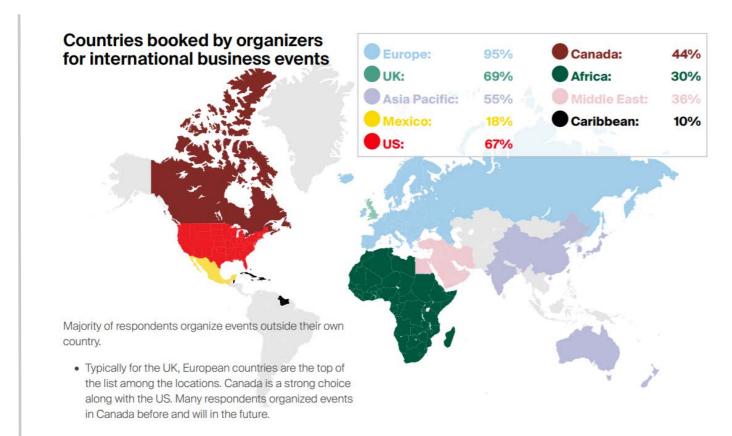

Canada will remain a strong choice for international business events—later

- Destination Canada's latest report on business events in Canada shows that Canada is a strong choice for international business events—many respondents said they have chosen Canada before and will again.
- However, uncertainty remains in international markets: UK planners intend to hold events closer to home, US associations are moving to smaller and hybrid events, and US financial sectors are looking at 2022 and beyond for events.
- Partnerships between destinations and organizations will be key and will require adapting business models and readily available packages with technology offerings.

Over 70% of American travellers plan to travel before 2022

- Destination Analysts, a US-based tourism research company, shows that over 70% of American travellers plan to travel before 2022.
- Of the nearly 30% of American travellers who have no plans to travel before 2021, almost 9% of US travellers have no travel plans until after 2022 and another 18% have no plans to travel in the future.
- Over 60% said Pfizer's vaccine announcement made them more or much more optimistic that they can travel safely in 2021.

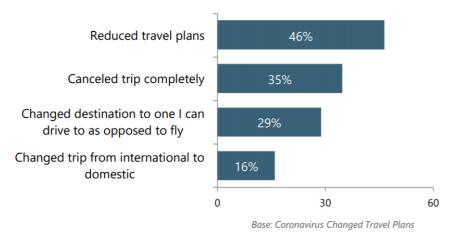

Almost 80% of US travellers changed their travel plans in the next six months

- A new survey of US citizens by Longwoods International shows that 77% of travellers planning to travel in the next six months will change their plans due to COVID-19.
- 46% of these respondents reduced their travel plans, while 35% cancelled their trip completely.



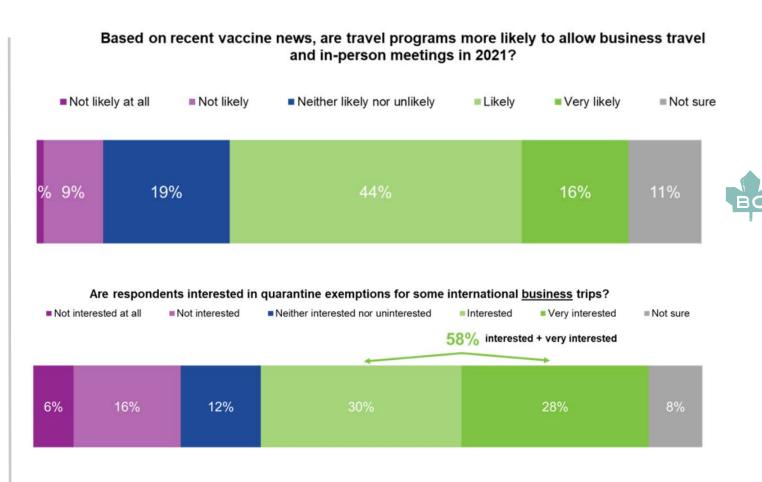

60% of global travel buyers are likely to allow business travel in 2021

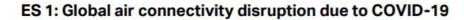
- The Global Business Travel Association's semiweekly poll tracks the impact of COVID-19 on the business travel industry. The November 19 Coronavirus Poll report showed that 60% of members surveyed, companies of travel buyers and procurement professionals, are likely or very likely to allow business travel and in-person meetings in 2021 based on recent vaccine news.
- 58% are at least interested in quarantine exemptions for some international business trips.

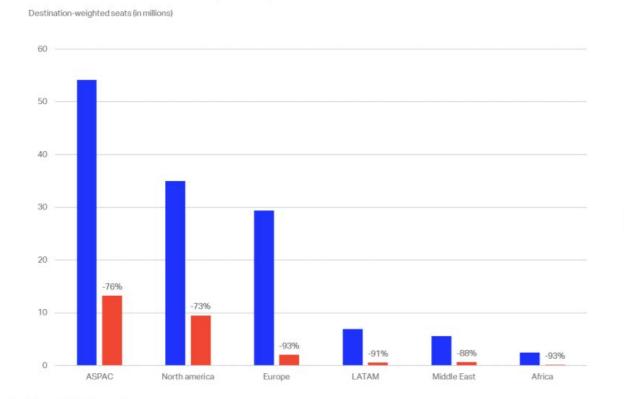

Domestic air hubs now most air-connected cities in the world

- A new report by the International Air Transport
 Association shows big changes in air connectivity.
 International destinations no longer dominate,
 with domestic hubs rising.
- London, the world's number one most connected city in September 2019, has declined by -67% in connectivity. It is now 8th.
- Shanghai is the new top city for connectivity. The top four most connected cities are in China: Shanghai, Beijing, Guangzhou and Chengdu.
- New York (-66% fall in connectivity), Tokyo (-65%), Bangkok (-81%), Hong Kong (-81%) and Seoul (-69%) are no longer in the top ten.
