We are in Step 3 of BC's Restart Plan, a 4-step plan launched on May 25, 2021.


Province-wide restrictions

The insights noted in this Research Roundup were gathered after the beginning of Step 3 on July 1, 2021. Health and safety protocols, such as physical distancing and capacity limits, vary by location and business type and remain in place until Step 4.

On July 19, 2021, Canada announced the opening of the border to fully vaccinated US citizens starting August 9. On September 7, Canada began allowing any fully vaccinated travellers entry into the country.


Destination BC is compiling relevant research and articles every two weeks related to the travel and tourism industry and COVID-19.

Last two weeks in brief:

- Destination Canada reports that 47% of BC residents feel safe travelling to other provinces
- Destination BC reports that BC residents' concern for welcoming visitors from other parts of Canada decreased -7 points to 58%

Destination Canada reports that 47% of BC residents feel safe travelling to other provinces


- In Destination Canada's latest Resident Sentiment report (October 12, 2021), 47% of BC residents reported feeling safe travelling to other provinces, an increase of +3 points from the previous wave.
- The same report showed that 81% of BC residents feel safe travelling to nearby communities and 72% of BC residents feel safe travelling to other communities within BC.
- Additionally, 21% of BC residents feel safe travelling to the US and 20% feel safe travelling internationally.

Destination BC reports that BC residents' concern for welcoming visitors from other parts of Canada decreased -7 points to 58%

- In Destination BC's latest BC
 Residents' Public Perceptions Wave
 38 (October 27, 2021) report, an
 estimated 58% of British Columbian
 residents said they were concerned
 welcoming visitors from other parts of
 Canada. This represents a decrease of
 -7 points from the previous wave
 (October 13, 2021).
- Additionally, concern for welcoming visitors from nearby communities for a day trip dropped -7 points to 31%, and concern for welcoming visitors from elsewhere in BC for an overnight trip fell -8 points to 41%.
- BC residents' concern for welcoming visitors from the US and from other countries both fell -3 points to 72% and 76% respectively.



BC weekly domestic overnight visitation decreased -0.8% from the previous week


- According to Environics Analytics Weekly COVID Tracker Report, during the week ending October 31, 2021, BC experienced a week-over-week decrease of -0.8% in weekly domestic overnight visitation.
- Week-over-week increases in domestic overnight visitation were seen in four of six tourism regions across the province:
 - Vancouver, Coast & Mountains (+0.3%)
 - Northern BC (+9.9%)
 - Kootenay Rockies (+26.2%)
 - Cariboo Chilcotin Coast (+34.5%)
- Week-over-week decreases in domestic overnight visitation were seen in the other two tourism regions across the province:
 - Thompson Okanagan (-7.1%)
 - Vancouver Island (-13.7%)








BC and Regional Domestic Overnight Visitation Week-over-Week Percent Change




BC sees an increase of +18.1% in weekly domestic overnight visitation compared to the same period in 2020

- For the week ending October 31, 2021, Environics Analytics reported that weekly domestic overnight visitation increased +18.1% compared to the same week in 2020. Compared to the same week in 2019, weekly domestic overnight visitation decreased -7.1%.
- Every tourism region, except Vancouver Island, saw a year-over-year increase in weekly visitation when compared to the same period in 2020. Three tourism regions, Vancouver, Coast & Mountains, Cariboo Chilcotin Coast, and Kootenay Rockies, saw a year-over-year increase in weekly visitation when compared to the same period in 2019.
 - Vancouver, Coast & Mountains (+35.7% over 2020; +1.1% over 2019)
 - Kootenay Rockies (+26.7%; +32.9%)
 - Northern BC (+26.7%; -13.6%)
 - Cariboo Chilcotin Coast (+13.8%; +12.6%)
 - Thompson Okanagan (+6.5%; -5.7%)
 - Vancouver Island (-7.9%; -17.8%)





Regional Domestic Overnight Visitation Year-over-Year Percent Change



BC's occupancy rate (53.6%) increased +18.5 points compared to the same period in 2020

- STR, an agency which reports BC's hotel performance, shows the average weekly occupancy rate for BC was 53.6% for the week of October 24 30, 2021. This represents a decrease of -5.3 points from the previous week.
- It also represents an increase of +18.5 points compared to a similar period in 2020 and a decrease of -2.9 points compared to a similar period in 2019.



BC's average daily rate (\$150.79) increased +26.5% compared to the same period in 2020

- STR, an agency which reports BC's hotel performance, shows BC's average daily rate (ADR) was \$150.79 for the week of October 24 30, 2021.
- This represents an increase of +26.5% compared to a similar period in 2020 and a decrease of -4.0% compared to 2019.

BC's RevPAR (\$80.89) decreased -9.6% from the previous week

- STR, an agency which reports BC's hotel performance, shows BC's revenue per available room (RevPAR) was \$80.89 for the week of October 24 30, 2021. This represents a decrease of -9.6% from the previous week.
- BC's RevPAR showed an increase (+93.1%) for the week of October 24 30, 2021 compared to a similar period in 2020 and a decrease (-8.7%) compared to 2019.
- RevPAR increased compared to a similar period in 2020 for all reported cities.
 RevPAR remains below 2019 levels for all reported cities except Whistler, Kamloops, and Revelstoke.

Destination BC's Snapshot of BC Travel reports that international bookings made up 38% of total BC Air Bookings for the week of Oct. 26 – Nov. 1

Some highlights from Destination BC's weekly Snapshot of BC Travel for the week of October 26 – November 1:

- International bookings made up 38% of total BC Air Bookings. (Forward Keys)
- BC Air Bookings are up +188.3% compared to the same period in 2020, but down -24.9% compared to the same period in 2019. (Forward Keys)
- Vancouver, Coast & Mountains and Thompson Okanagan regions make up 61% of BC's domestic visitation. (Environics Analytics)





Skift reports the Global Recovery Index has increased to 62 points out of 100 in September 2021

- According to the Skift, the Global Recovery Index, an overall index of travel performance based on factors such as car rentals, flights, and lodging; increased by +3 points from August 2021 to 52 points in September 2021. This is in comparison to a baseline reading out of 100 for the same period in 2019.
- The countries which saw the largest increase in their Recovery Index score were generally in the Asia Pacific region. For example, China's Recovery Index rose +13 points between August and September.

Destination Analysts reports that 30.5% of US travellers are more interested in travelling after the announcement of the US border reopening

- According to Destination Analysts' latest Travel Sentiment Index (November 2, 2021), 30.5% of American travellers said that the announcement of the US border reopening to international travellers in November would make them more interested in travelling in the next 6 months.
- In comparison, 52.1% of US travellers said that the border reopening would have no impact on their interest in travelling in the next 6 months, and 17.5% said it would make them less interested.










UNWTO reports 50% of the global population has received at least one dose of a vaccine

- According to the UNWTO, as of November 4, 2021, the global average for vaccination rates (with at least one dose) is at 50.0 out of every 100 people.
- The same dashboard shows that as of November 4, 2021, Canada has vaccinated (with at least one dose) 78.6 out of every 100 people, compared to the US which has vaccinated 66.2 out of every 100 people, and Sweden which has vaccinated 71.5 out of every 100 people.
